### **What Visa do I get?**

All volunteers must have a Cambodian business visa in order to be allowed to work or volunteer here. The business visa can also be arranged on-arrival at airport and overland borders, costs \$25USD for 30 days and can be extended in country indefinitely. Options for extension are one month (\$45USD), three months (\$75USD), six months (\$155USD) and one year (\$285USD). Six months and one year extended visas are multiple entry visas.

### **What clothing is appropriate in Cambodia?**

People in Cambodia are very modest. Bare shoulders in front of a monk, at the temples or in a pagoda are considered offensive. Singlets, hipster trousers and skirts that show your belly button are also not appropriate, with short shorts and skirts being frowned upon. When volunteering, a t-shirt and long shorts, jeans, pants or long skirts is appropriate.

### **Can I drink tap water?**

Unless you have a stomach made of steel, we would recommend drinking bottled/filtered water only. Many tourists also choose to brush their teeth with bottled water.

### **What vaccinations do I need for Cambodia?**

Please refer to your local Doctor for advice on the vaccinations required for Cambodia or follow your country's Government Travel and Health Advisory Council.

### **Do I need Medical travel insurance?**

This of course is a personal preference; however, we strongly recommend you organize travel insurance.
